LET'S TAKE A DRIVE TO MOUNT GAMBIER!



Every two years the MX-5 Clubs of South Australia and Victoria get together somewhere near the border to spend a weekend of good food, good wine, good company and good roads.

This year the event was held on the weekend of 2 -3 October in the magnificent town of Mount Gambier.

Twelve Victorians made the journey west in four MX-5s and two family cars. From Geelong, Robyn

and Theo Scheen and from Torquay, Coral and Bill Campbell had the enviable drive along the coast to Mount Gambier, whilst Sue Dixon and Ernie de Vlieger, and Meriden and I drove over from Melbourne via Ballarat.
