

Don's Drive(l) ...

Welcome to 2015, a special year for our Club.

On 6 May it will be 25 years since 130-plus MX-5s gathered at the Old Cheese Factory in Berwick at the invitation of Mazda Australia. The Club was born at this meeting and became formally incorporated in August. We plan to celebrate both events during the year. Stay tuned for more information.

The 2015 calendar, which all members should have received by now, has been something of a hit judging by the positive responses we have received. It was originally conceived as one way we could mark the Club's 25th anniversary. However there have been many strong suggestions that we repeat the idea for 2016. Something for the January Committee meeting.

I trust you all survived the Christmas and New Year festivities without too much damage to the wallet, purse or liver. And, hopefully, nobody suffered the indignity of a bulging disc in the lower back as did "she who must be obeyed". New Year was very flat, literally for Linda. However things are on the improve and decent food may be on the plate soon.

The Club run to the Strath Creek and Reedy Creek CFA attracted a group of 19 cars as you will read in Alan Bennet's report. Thanks to the Club's cheque for \$250 and the amazing generosity of run participants (including one couple who were unable to attend), we raised a total of \$473 for the brigade which, as always, was very much appreciated. From the brigade's viewpoint our run was a little close to Christmas and the fire season, which meant that many of their members were unable to attend. Something to consider for next time.

Leaving home in Research, the circuit up to Kinglake and across to Healesville via Myers Creek Road followed by the return up Chum Creek Road has become something of a stress release trip for me. I've done the trip at all times of the day and evening, but I have to say that the road from St Andrews to Kinglake is rapidly becoming a cyclists' domain, regardless of when you use the road. Those of you on the CFA/Christmas run will have experienced a taste of this phenomenon.

Over the Christmas holidays I suffered the unnerving experience of a cyclist coming around a blind corner in the

opposite direction, running out of road and deciding to use the *passenger* side of my car (ie, the "drop" side of the road) to avoid a head-on collision. No damage was done, words were exchanged but I was left with the distinct impression that I had no right to be using the road at that time of the morning.

Those of you who use Beach Road at the weekend will be very familiar with the challenges of sharing the road with cyclists. Having raced a bike in my youth, I have no particular issue around this sharing, but we may well be approaching the time when we need to take a hint from the French. There are roads in Paris and several of the major French cities which are closed to vehicles early morning over the weekends, giving cyclists the chance of a car-free experience. I read somewhere that this is being considered for Beach Road. May be there is a case for something similar on the St Andrews-Kinglake road. Knowing the way Nillumbik Council works, I won't be holding my breath as they are just as likely to put up 30kmh speed restrictions to solve the problem, which will not please anybody – drivers and cyclists alike.

There must be something about accepting the El Presidente role in this Club, as a quick check of the foregoing paragraphs would suggest that I seem to be getting grumpier. I was looking in back copies of this magazine for inspiration for my monthly rant and, to my surprise, found that Murray was also wont to "have a go". Maybe it's the prospect of these words appearing in print, or maybe it's the fact that it's nudging 40 degrees as I type ... or maybe it's age. I would like to think it's age as it is the one thing I can't do anything about (the numbers at least). But I do have a New Year's resolution hanging over my head which says that I need to fix the things which can be fixed and leave those which can't. With that in mind I'll take the family car to the carwash and leave the mowing until winter when there might be the odd blade of grass in need of a trim.

The long drive: Australia - toe to tip & back

You're going where, in what and for how many days?

That's the response I received from friends after telling them I was driving my MX-5 from Hobart to Tallebudgera, on the Gold Coast in Queensland, for the Pan Pacific Games and then on to Hervey Bay.

Total distance return, including side trips and return boat journey: 5500km.

Northbound was via Melbourne, Cootamundra, Gunnedah and Ballina. After competing in the target archery at the Games it was on to Hervey Bay to my sister's place via Brisbane, Gympie and Maryborough.

For my first long drive I was pleasantly surprised at how comfortable the MX-5 is for long distance travel. (Melbourne to Gold Coast: two days). The car was fully loaded, had a boot full of archery gear, and front footwell and passenger seat holding all my luggage in three soft bags.

One item on my needs list for future trips would be cruise control ... right foot on throttle for long periods can be tiring.

The return trip was via Brisbane, Coffs Harbour, Sydney, Eden, Lakes Entrance and Melbourne. On the way home I was fortunate to be in Melbourne for the 25-year celebration at Sandown Park. It turned out to be one of the best gatherings it has been my pleasure to attend, and the great barbeque lunch was a bonus.

Laps of Sandown Raceway were another highlight, including entering the left hander into the back straight too quickly and having the rear tyres making noises I don't usually hear on a normal day. Many thanks to all concerned for organising such a great day. I felt privileged to represent the little island.

For those with a statistical bent, my trip included 10 main driving days, 5541 km, 389L fuel at a total cost of \$657.00. Fuel consumption averaged approx. 7L per 100km.

In conclusion, as my first long trip in the MX-5, I'd recommend it to any owner. It's one of the best cars on today's roads.



For something different, this was an afternoon/evening run held on a Saturday, and we could not have ordered more perfect weather – a brilliant blue sky with a slight breeze.

Meeting time was 3.30pm in Beechworth, which allowed plenty of time beforehand for browsing the eclectic array of shops unique to this beautiful historic town, or to sit and relax at the *Beechworth Bakery* (actually in Beechworth!) with a coffee and one of their famous beestings.

Time to hit the road, and six cars headed off toward the King Valley passing through small townships such as Everton, Milawa – the culinary crossroads of Victoria (well, that is what the sign says) – and Oxley. We then took a left turn, and could be forgiven for thinking we had been transported to the picturesque hills of northern Italy. Passing wineries such as Dal Zotto, Pizzini, La Cantina and Politini, it's evident that first-, second- and third-generation Italian migrant families are continuing the family tradition, tending to the vineyards and making beautiful Mediterranean-inspired wines.

And so it was with great anticipation that we reached our first stop at King River Estate winery. It was here that Shane and Loz joined the run (someone had to work ... and it wasn't Shane). Winemaker Trevor welcomed us warmly and presented complimentary gourmet pizzas and cheese platters which included his delicious homemade salami. We sampled cool, crisp white wines and savoury spicy reds while Trevor explained his philosophy – "to make wine using traditional old-world winemaking methods, wild yeast and biodynamic practices". It works a charm ... if the number of brown paper bags filled with wine bottles that made their way to the boots of the waiting MX-5s was anything to go by.

It was then time to continue on our way to Lake William Hovell. It's hard to put into words how beautiful the scenery was and how wonderful the roads were to drive on. Winding roads alongside the gin-clear waters of the King River, past rows of grapevines, rustic tobacco drying sheds, rambling cottages, old churches, raised water tanks covered with climbing roses, sun glistening off full dams, and black Angus cows and calves briefly pausing to watch the cars speed by.

All too soon we were at the dam which, at full capacity, looked stunning. We enjoyed more conversation whilst some paddled their feet in the cool water. Before leaving, Maree presented home-made Christmas goodies to Kerry and Diana for the best-dressed car and to Ron and Marg for another fantastic job organising our Chapter's activities in 2014.

It was then on to the Whitfield Hotel for dinner. Great food, along with some local grape juice, great company and great conversation (and some card tricks by Brian) made the evening fly. 



My favourite MX-5 road ...

Myrtleford - Stanley - Beechworth

Any visit to Myrtleford has to include a visit to the Red Ramia store and the Café Fez. Even better however is the leaving of it.

The road through the Stanley State Forest begins some 14K north of Myrtleford along the Myrtleford-Yackandandah road.

As you turn left towards Stanley you start the climb with plantation pines on your left and regenerating bush on the right. It is really dense bush country that suffered badly during the 2009 fires, traces of which are still clearly evident. The newlyresurfaced road is in excellent condition despite the fact that it only has centre road markers, but you do have to be careful of some potential rock slippages along the way. On the plus side traffic is almost non-existent and what little there is, is easy enough to spot at a distance.

The 16km hike to Stanley is a great mix of good constant radius corners and some lovely sweepers providing some exhilarating bits and a chance to look outside the car as well. It's so good it could well have been designed as a slightly more comfortable MX-5 test track. As you get closer to Stanley the bush gives way to European style open forest with apple and chestnut orchards on either side of the road and lovely wide nature strips that set off beautifully manicured gardens. It is a great autumn drive,



with lunch at the Stanley pub a must.

The last 9km section to Beechworth is a little more straightforward giving you more of a chance to appreciate a very picturesque countryside.

Total time from Myrtleford to Beechworth: 35-40 minutes.

Mazda6 global production reaches 3 million units

Total global production of the Mazdab reached three million units at the end of November 2014.
