



On 1 July, an important email came to me but I didn't know about it.

A phone call was made to my dad, John, and he rang and texted me multiple times - I did not answer as I was working! What was so important that could not wait till I got home?

Well ... in two days' time, MOTOR magazine wanted to pay me to hire my original Classic Red NA MX-5 (the 38th built for Australia) for a photo shoot and drive comparison alongside a new ND MX-5 at a local race track.

I said "yes" - without hesitation. I would have done it for free!

As I'm still on my L-plates I needed a supervising driver, so my dad came with me to Bryant Park, the Gippsland Car Club's tight and twisty figure-of-eight hillclimb track. There we met MOTOR magazine's editor Dylan Campbell and motoring writer Scott Newman who drove both vehicles. Professional photographer Cristian Brunelli spent over three hours taking hundreds of photographs of the two cars.

Tony Mee, Mazda Australia's public relations specialist, drove a red NC ... and waiting on the truck, which had brought it in secret to this secluded track, was the ND. Eastern Victoria Chapter Captain Peter Ferguson arrived in his NC "Pearl" and Rob Krygsman (pictured at left, with Nic) in his Velocity Red NB SE.

So, there was now a red NA, NB, NC and ND MX-5 at the track today.

The new ND looks like an NC that has been to boot camp to lose a few kilos – taking it back closer to its NA roots.

I felt like the most privileged teenager in Australia today as I drove my car alongside one of only two NDs in Australia around the track - many thanks to Peter Ferguson, Mazda Australia and MOTOR magazine for this amazing experience.

When we finished Scott took me for a hell-for-leather lap of the track as co-pilot – one I will not forget.

I felt that the new ND could be likened to the NA and much like a go-kart. Its fine-tuned suspension – providing a comfortable ride while not compromising cornering capability - a punchy and reactive driveline along with an exhaust note to please creates a memorable ride.

The MX-5 is back, and better than ever.

Club racer Max Lloyd is urging Club members to turn out for the "Drive for Life" touring road event in support of suicide prevention education in September.



Organised annually by the **Drive** For Life Suicide Prevention **Association**, the 2015 event will run in two separate divisions using different roads for each division.

1. Social Drive for beginners and enthusiasts who want to take their car for a nice drive on interesting roads by following a simple set of directions (no traps).

There are no special requirements – just a current driver's licence and a passenger to read you the directions.

2. Championship course for those competing in the HRA Touring series and Standard Car class championships. This is a challenging tulip route course for CAMS-affiliated club members. A CAMS Level 2NS licence or better is required. Licences at this level can be purchased from the CAMS website (www.cams.com.au) or applied for on the day.

No experience is necessary to enjoy this event and you won't be alone as a new starter.

All you need is a registered road car, a licensed driver and a passenger who can read and interpret basic route instructions. **Please note:** this is NOT a speed event. All Victorian road rules will apply.

The event starts in Eltham and tours through the picturesque Yarra Ranges and Yarra valley areas. It will take approximately four hours in total to complete the event, including a rest stop. A BBQ lunch is available at the finish destination. It's a great way to spend your Sunday with family or friends.

We are expecting a capacity field this year, with places allocated on receipt of official entry.

Pile out of a perfectly comfortable warm bed in the middle of the night to drive to Phillip Island in the cold and rain for the fun of lining up in the dark, ready for the gates to be thrown open at 7am. Nothing like it, and I wouldn't miss it for guids.

Round 4 of the Club Sprint Championship is on, and it's another chance to run on one of the great circuits of the world. In my overseas business trips many of the people I deal with are petrol heads of the nicest kind. All talk about two Aussie circuits: Bathurst, and "the Island."

My favourite MX-5 road ...

Yarra Junction to Trafalgar

This 90-minute run from Yarra Junction to Trafalgar was one of my first social runs when I joined the Club in 2007. It's an enjoyable drive that I have done a few times each year since.

If you're coming from central Melbourne you'll need to commit at least half a day to this run – there is a considerable drive to get to the start and return from the end point.

Leaving Yarra Junction, head south on the Yarra Junction-Noojee Road (C425). You will find the first 15 or so kilometres a sedate drive, with the speed limit changing between 60 and 80 km/h on a fairly straight road. Slowing to go through Powelltown, you will see the first of the number of sawmills in the area, so you will need to watch out for logging trucks further along.

You will now climb up into the state forest and, though the speed limit is only 80 km/h, the windy road provides a lot of fun. The road then starts to flow, allowing you to stretch the legs of your MX-5. The road is a little bumpy and does have some small pot holes so be careful not to hit

too many of them. You will eventually arrive at Noojee – a great place to stop for a coffee or maybe lunch at the Noojee hotel.

Leaving Noojee you will be on your way to Mt Baw Baw, but you'll be turning right when you reach the Willow Grove road to Moe (C465). This road narrows considerably (no shoulders) and can be a little slippery if there's debris and moisture on the road. You need to be careful in the dry, too – it's tempting to get a little spirited along this road, but with quite a few blind corners you need to make sure you don't meet a logging truck coming the other way.

You will reach Fumina South and from here you will get your first glimpse of the Latrobe Valley. Unfortunately, there is little room to stop to admire the view, but slow down and take in the view - you should be able to see a power station or two from here.

Continue driving until you reach Willow Grove, turning right to Trafalgar (C463) just as you arrive. The next 24km is a



flowing run down to Trafalgar.

Once you reach Trafalgar, you may wish to turn right and drive to Yarragon Village where you can enjoy a coffee or meal.

The drive home from here via the Princes Freeway is less rewarding though. Maybe it would be better to drive home via the same route in the opposite direction, one thing I am yet to do.

A box full of neutrals?

I had an interesting issue in my NA 1600 recently that may also happen to others. It's worth passing on in case someone else has a similar issue.

I was on my way home from the most recent Eastern Victoria Chapter khanacross event at Bryant Park when the gearshift started becoming really vague, and it was difficult to select 5th and 6th.

I had to park somewhere before I got home and fortunately parked nose uphill ... because, when I came back to the car, I could not select reverse – but was able to roll backwards.

By the time I got home, the gearstick was "all over the place" and could be lifted UP a bit. Strange ...

Being an NA, it's a simple five-minute job (five screws) to remove the armrest section of the console, then another four 6mm bolts to remove the shift boot.

On removing the shift boot, I expected to see three 6mm bolts holding down the surround that locates the gear stick to the gearbox.

Not this time! Two bolts were missing and the remaining one was half way out - no wonder the stick was a bit wobbly!

It seems I was probably lucky to make it

Someone else fitted the six-speed gearbox for me and he clearly did not tighten these bolts properly! (they should not be over tightened as they go straight into the alloy housing)

I picked up some new plated M6 finethread bolts and put them in with spring washers. A five-minute job.

The other thing to keep an eye out for, if the gear stick has become really vague, is the plastic bush on the base of the gearstick. If this is broken or missing, you can still change gears, but it's not nice.

This is another dead easy job so, if your gear stick suddenly becomes very vague, there are likely two very simple solutions - but one of them (loose or missing bolts) may need some pretty quick action to avoid being stranded.

The plastic bushes (see photo) are available from many places, including online from MX-5 Mania.







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
