The 22nd of April 2016 marked a milestone moment for the Mazda MX-5. This was the date the One Millionth Mazda MX-5 was produced at Mazda's Hiroshima plant in Japan.

It has taken 27 years, but, this moment is sure to entrench the MX-5 with the Guinness World Record for "the world's best-selling two-seater sports car". The One-Millionth MX-5 is a Japanese spec, 1.5-litre soft-top and will be displayed at fan events in Japan and around the world. Let's hope we get a glimpse if it comes to Australia.

NotMeet in WA?

Last month I joined the latest Presidents' teleconference for all of the MX-5 Clubs in Australia. This is an opportunity for the clubs to share key initiatives and information on what each club is doing, to ensure that the MX-5 clubs nationally continue to grow.

Again it was pleasing to get more positive feedback for NatMeet, however, the focus now moves to the next NatMeet in South Australia in 2018

At this teleconference, the Western Australian club presented a proposal for an event called the 'Go West NotMeet'. A NatMeet would require a minimum number of entrants (probably more than 60 cars and 100 entrants) to be successful

and it is unlikely that enough eastern State members would commit to travel to Western Australia for such an event.

This has not stopped the Western Australian club suggesting the 'Go West NotMeet' as an alternative event. Designed to attract the eastern State member to the West, it could incorporate a wide range of drives exploring large parts of Western Australia over a fourweek period or it could allow members to only concentrate on the south west of the State.

No dates have yet been set and it won't happen before the next NatMeet in 2018. But you might be interested in planning well ahead for a trip to the west, joining a number of like-minded members. We will keep you posted as more information comes to hand.

To run or not to run ...

Extreme weather events have always been a part of the Australian landscape and some would say that these events are likely to intensify in both frequency and severity in the future.

At the last Committee meeting the 'Extreme Weather Guidelines' for Club events were finalised. These guidelines are designed to assist event organisers about decisions that may be need to be taken if an extreme weather event occurs on or around a Club event. The guidelines provide all event organisers the opportunity to cancel an event if they believe an extreme weather events or incidents (including bushfire, floods, snow/ice, etc) could potentially expose members to harm.

Careful consideration is always given to whether an event is cancelled and we also rely on the local knowledge of our members when making such a decision. However, should an event be cancelled, every attempt will be made to inform members of the decision, via the Club's website, email and/or SMS.

Talking of the Club's website, there are some new videos uploaded to the home page. If you haven't visited the website for a while, I encourage you to return on a regular basis to see what's been added. And remember, the Club's online calendar will keep you up to date on all the upcoming events.

Closing on another record ...

We are close to the end of the membership year at 30 June, and we are approaching 700 members for the first time. This will set a new record for the Club, and though I am sure that the ND has helped boost the numbers in the last six months, it is also those members who renew each year that allow the Club to continue to grow.

Enjoy the month ahead. Even though the weather is cooling, there is lots of Club activity for members.

And remember ... leave sooner, drive slower, live longer.

2016 City Mazda MX-5 Sprint Championship - Round 3, Sandown

Round 4 is back at Sandown on Saturday, 7 May, so we will see if a little practice the week before makes for some quicker times.

Starting out in MX-5 motor sport

Over the past 6-12 months we have had an increase in the number of new members wanting to try some motor sport in their MX-5s.

When Randy and I speak with these people, a lot of common questions come up: "What MX-5 should I buy?", "Do I need a CAMS licence?", "Can I get an instructor?" In our Club we have always tried to support new people taking the big step of putting their MX-5 on to a track.

The Club has a number of steps in place to make this leap a little less daunting. A lot of people starting out are concerned that

they need to have all the gear for their first event: helmets, tools, race suits, race seat, harnesses etc. are all great to have, but not all are required on your first event. The Club has loan helmets that can be used by new members just wanting to try a track day, to see if they enjoy it.

Likewise a few people ask, "Should I go and do an advanced driving course before I go on the track". Again, if you are just wanting to come and have a try, then the Club makes sure we allocate an experienced competitor to sit with you for the first session on the track and help you through what, for someone who has never driven on a race track before, can be daunting.

So, if you are thinking of coming along and having a try here are my tips:

- Don't rush off and buy an MX-5 that you 'think' you 'need' for motor sport – a standard MX-5 with basic safety checks, good tyres and brakes is a very capable car on the track.
- Come along to one of our track days and introduce yourself, ask questions; our Motor Sport Team is a great bunch of people and they all started out once with their first day.
- There's no such thing as a 'dumb' question. Randy and I are always on the other end of an email to help out with any information you need.

Mazda produces 1,000,000th Mazda MX-5

Production of the Mazda MX-5 reached one million units on April 22, 2016. The milestone figure was achieved over 27 years, with mass-production of the MX-5 starting at Ujina Plant No. 1 in Hiroshima in April 1989.

As a way of expressing thanks to MX-5 fans and owners, the One Millionth MX-5 will be displayed at fan events in Japan and around the world. The tour began on 3 May at the Hiroshima Flower Festival where the car will participate in the Flower Parade.

The MX-5 is a symbol of Mazda's carmaking philosophy and tireless pursuit of driving pleasure. Since its debut in 1989, the model has consistently offered driving fun that can only be experienced in a lightweight sports car and won the admiration of people from various

countries, cultures and age groups.

The MX-5 has held the Guinness World Record for the best-selling open-top two-seater sports car for many years.

The MX-5 is also critically acclaimed, with over 200 awards from around the globe >

Today's meeting for the **Three Dams run** was to be at the Trafalgar Holden Museum. Participants started arriving and numbers soon swelled to 34 people and 19 MX-5s.

Discussion and greetings over coffee included commentary on David and Leeanne's car bra to the 19 cars and of course the Museum vehicles. Many thanks to the Museum's obliging management.


















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New deal on welding gases ...

While I had my own business, I was always able to justify having an oxy set and later, a MIG and TIG welder in my home workshop - made doing "odd jobs" and building stuff really easy (only THEN I could not find the time to use it!)

Now I'm retired, I can find the time, but the cost of bottle hire became so prohibitive that a few years back I sent back the bottles. I started using gasless wire in the MIG, and keep looking at my TIG welder wishing I could use it ... but it NEEDS gas!

I started seeing ads about where you could purchase bottles outright, at about \$450 per bottle plus refill and, although this is expensive, had resolved to myself I'd pay the one-time cost and at least have the convenience of being able to do jobs when I

I was about to take the plunge when I saw at Bunnings (of all places!) that they are supplying gas in another form: you pay a one-time deposit (which is refundable on return of the bottles) and then you pay for the re-filling in a changeover bottle, similar to BBQ gas. Brilliant!

The deposit on each bottle is \$200 - not cheap but you get it back as it's only a deposit.

Re-fills on the bottles are also not cheap – \$99 for acetylene and welding gases and \$69 for oxy.

However, as there is no ongoing rent on the bottles, I'm happy to pay a premium price for the convenience of having the gear when I need it.

If you are in the same situation, nip down to Bunnings and get yourself organised. There MAY also be some other suppliers doing the same (deposit) deal.





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
